Please read this before bidding!

Welcome to the second virtual TEC Auction!

Here's the auction catalog to review in advance. If you want to bid, please put your full name and TEC # under your picture when you join the meeting. (If you don't know how to rename yourself, don't worry, the host will do it for you if you start bidding.)

What you need to know:

When the auction starts, the host will display the catalog and mute everyone except our auctioneer, Bob Fritsch.

If you want to bid on an item, unmute yourself and speak up loud and clear. Bob won't be able to see everyone at once, so just raising your hand won't do. Bob must hear your bid.

If you unmute to kibbitz or if there is background noise coming from you, the host will mute you, so pay attention to your microphone. The auctioneer must be able to hear the bidders.

The auction will be recorded in case we need to confirm any bids. The recording is just a backup. It will not be published.

To account for Zoom lag, Bob will slow down his usual auctioneer patter. He has practiced on Zoom. However, we cannot account for all that might happen with many bidders. Please be patient as everyone gets the hang of it.

The auction is limited to 90 minutes. All items in the catalog should be addressed within that time. If not, Bob will pause at 75 minutes and ask if anyone wants to bid on an unsold lot and call that lot.

Where multiple of an item are available, the option to buy any or all of the extras goes first to winning bidder, then to the underbidder, then to anyone.

Following the auction, our secretary, Terri Ventresca, will send each successful bidder an invoice for their items plus postage. Instructions for payment will be included in the invoice. Your items will ship after your payment is received.

Listen for key phrases. Each lot will go something like this:

"The item up for bid is DESCRIPTION. Do I hear an opening bid of \$1?"

If you want to make an opening bid, unmute and speak slowly and clearly.

"I have a bid of \$1 from Adam. Do I hear a bid of \$2? I have a bid of \$2 from Barbara."

At this point, only Adam and Barbara are bidding. Bob will call each bidder by name, *"Adam, do you bid \$3?"* And then, *"Barbara, do you bid \$4?"* He will continue until Adam or Barbara drops out.

At this point, a new bidder will have a chance to come in. *"I have a bid of \$3. Do I hear an advance on \$3? I have a bid of \$4 from Carrie. Adam, do you bid \$5?"* Adam and Carrie bid until one drops. Then a new bidder has a chance to come in.

Again, we will only do two bidders at a time. Please honor this restriction even if you want to jump in immediately. The cycle repeats as bidders drop and add themselves until there is no more advance.

How Maryland Became A State

When British settlers arrived in Maryland in 1633, they were led by a nobleman named Lord Baltimore. Baltimore started a new colony that was named Mariland, after Queen Henrietta Maria of England. The name of the colony was later changed to Maryland. The colonists settled along the Chesapeake Bay because it gave them a place to moor their boats. Maryland is an unusual state. The Chesapeake Bay splits Maryland almost in half.

The settlers built two main cities: Baltimore, named after Lord Baltimore, and Annapolis, which became the state's capital. In 1788, Maryland became the seventh state. Three years later, part of Maryland alongside the Potomac River was used to make Washington, D.C., the nation's capital.

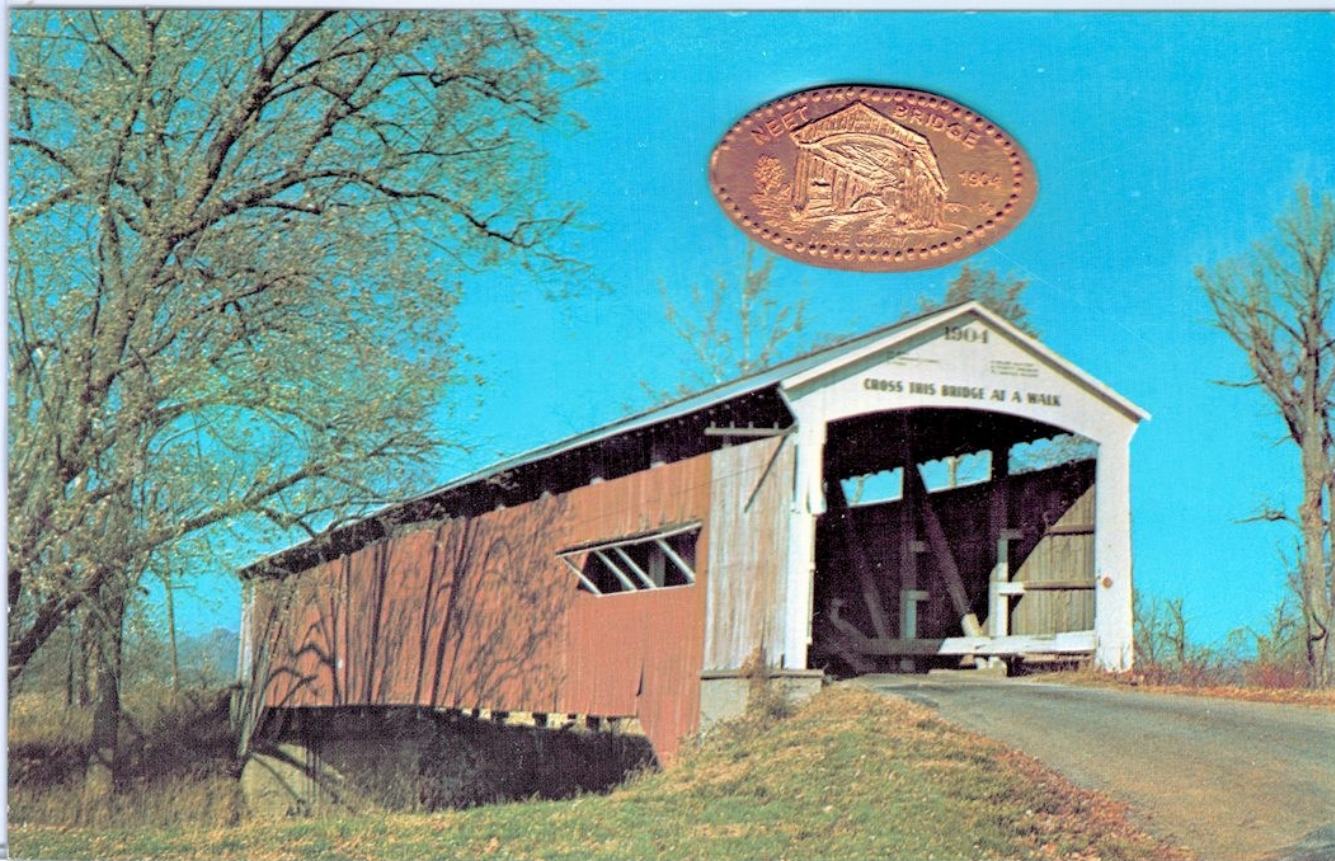

SOUTH PASS LIGHTHOUSE

The light at South Pass was scheduled to be deactivated following the completion of an iron tower at Southwest Pass, however, when Eads' jetties greatly improved the channel at South Pass, the Lighthouse Board decided to place an iron tower at South Pass too. The hexagonal tower, completed in 1881, had a height of 105 feet, and a two-story, iron-clad, dwelling was built at its base.



On April 8, 1923, keeper I.C.M. Erickson set off across the river in a rowboat. Perhaps he was tired that day, as the current swept him out into the gulf. Erickson never made it back to the station.

Today, the tall iron tower is still active, although the first-order Fresnel lens was replaced in 1951 with a modern beacon. That same year the station also lost another keeper, but fortunately it was just to automation and not to the Gulf.

2006 Soccer World Cup Games

2006 FIFA World Cup qualification

198 teams attempted to qualify for the 2006 World Cup. *Germany*, the host nation, was granted automatic qualification, with the remaining 31 finals places divided among the continental confederations. This was the first World Cup for which the title holders were not granted automatic qualification. Thirteen places were contested by UEFA teams (Europe), five by CAF teams (Africa), four by CONMEBOL teams (South America), four by AFC teams (Asia), and three by CONCACAF teams (North and Central America and Caribbean). The remaining two places were decided by playoffs between AFC and CONCACAF and between CONMEBOL and OFC (Oceania).

For the first time since the 1982 World Cup, all six confederations were represented at the finals tournament.

Amos 'N' Andy Show



Amos 'n' Andy is a set in Manhattan's historic black community of Harlem. The show was very popular in the United States from the 1920s through the 1950s on both radio and television. The radio show was written and voiced by two white actors playing a number of different characters: the titular Amos Jones and Andrew Hogg Brown, George Stevens, better known as "The Kingfish," "Lightnin'", and many others. The number of characters portrayed by the two performers required not only their own vocal versatility, but compelled them to invent a number of innovative microphone techniques to help convey the illusion of multiple characters in the same space.

As the show came to television, black actors took over the overwhelming majority of the roles; white characters were infrequent. *Amos 'n' Andy* began as one of the first radio comedy series, written and voiced by Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll and originating from station WMAQ in Chicago.

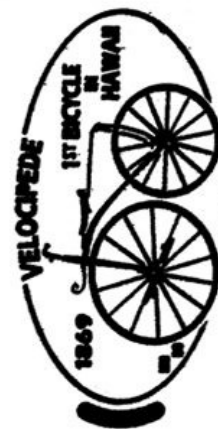
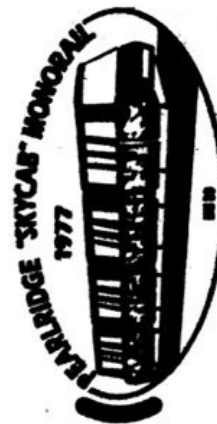

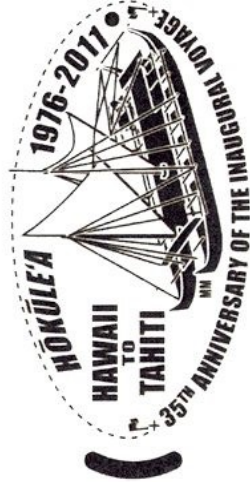

Hōkūleʻa Hawaii to Tahiti Voyage 1976 - 2021 45th Anniversary – May 1, 2021

Elongated Copper Cent & Hawaii State Quarter Set



May 1, 2021 is the 45th Anniversary of departure for Hōkūleʻa's maiden voyage to Tahiti from Honolulu Bay, Maui. That day in 1976 was the first time in 600 years that a Polynesian voyaging canoe sailed deep sea. It would take them 34 days to reach Tahiti.

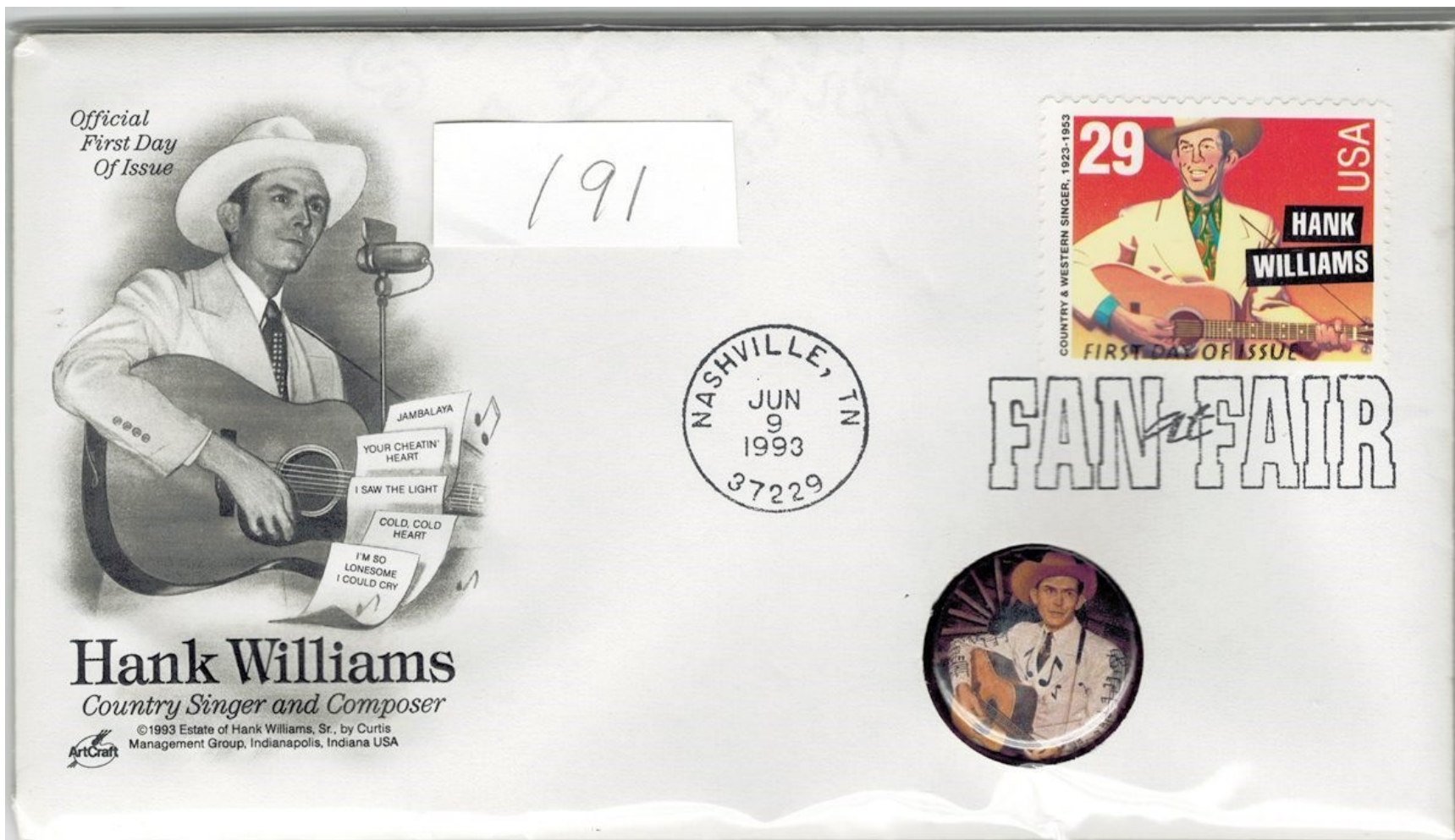
Led by Captain Elia David Kuʻualoha "Kawika" Kapahulehua and Navigator Pius "Mau" Pīlalug, a Yapese master navigator. Hōkūleʻa departed Honolulu Bay, Maui, Hawaiʻi for Papeʻete, Tahiti, as part of the celebration of the United States Bicentennial. Mau navigated from Hawaii to Tahiti without instruments. The return leg employed western instruments (compass, nautical charts, sextant, chronometer, dividers, parallel rulers, pencil, nautical almanac).

On board the inaugural voyage was Hoku, a golden hair Hawaiian poi dog backbred by Jack L. Throp of the Honolulu Zoo. Razor-backed pigs and Polynesian chickens were also bred at the zoo for the voyage but the director would not part with them at the last minute. Instead, the voyage hurriedly brought a white domesticated pig from Kōkeʻe, Kauai named Maxwell, and a cock and hen. The purpose of the animals was to study how to feed and care for these animals which were brought by the Polynesians during their voyages.

These elongated coins were rolled using the original 35th Anniversary dies with a "dot" added after the dates to indicate "re-rolled" coins for the 45th Anniversary - 2021.

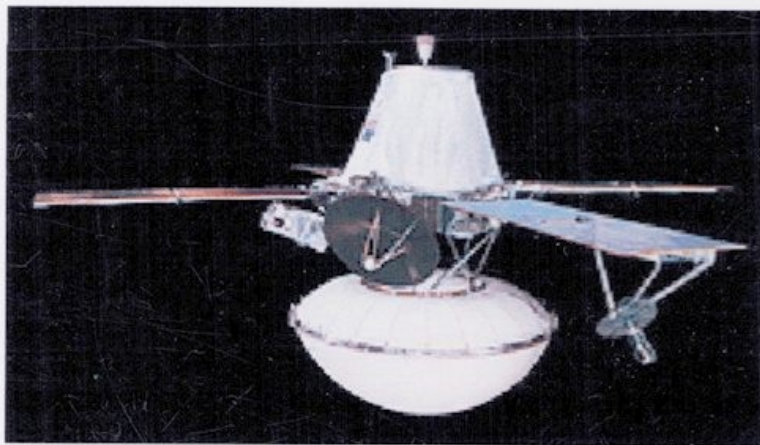

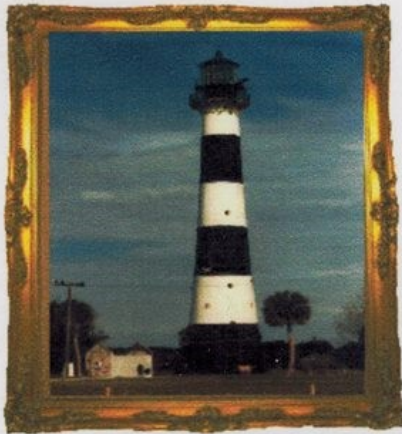

CAPE CANAVERAL LIGHTHOUSE

In 1843, the U.S. Government selected Cape Canaveral as the site for a permanent lighthouse. The eastern tip of the Cape made a natural choice for this vital aid to navigation. Construction of the original Cape Canaveral lighthouse, made of brick, was completed in 1847.

The first permanent lighthouse keeper, Captain M. O. Burnham, arrived at Cape Canaveral in 1853. Loyal to the Confederacy during the Civil War, Burnham complied with orders that the Cape Canaveral lighthouse be dismantled to hinder Union Navigation. The U. S. Government decided to erect a brand new lighthouse rather than rebuild the old one.

The new lighthouse was completed in 1868. Instead of brick, it was constructed of wood. The wood was later reinforced with a combination of steel plating, brick and concrete to help the structure better weather the elements.

In 1886, the ocean began to dangerously erode the sand near the lighthouse, and a decision was made to relocate the structure about 1.5 miles inland. This project began in 1892 and completed in 1894.

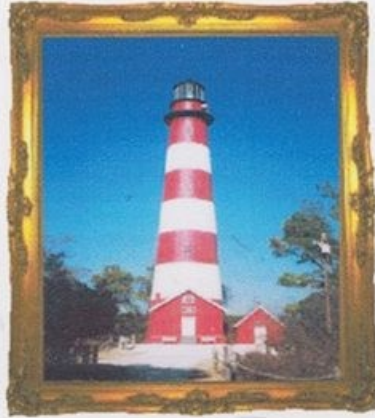

ASSATEAGUE ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE

The first keeper of the lighthouse was Mr. David Watson, who assumed the duty in the year 1833. In 1933 the lighthouse was converted from oil to electricity.

In March of 1942 Norman Jones became the keeper and continued as keeper until the Coast Guard took over and supplied the lighthouse with commercial power.

Assateague Lighthouse is 142 feet tall, it stands on a hill some 22 feet above mean high water, and it's a monster, at over 27 feet in diameter at the base. Painted in Red and White horizontal stripes, it's not only a colorful symbol of the Island and the area, but a monument to the changing ways of nature.

Built in 1833 at a cost of \$55,000.00, the lighthouse was eventually rebuilt into its present form in 1867. Over the years this lighthouse has used candles, a standard oilburner plunger lamp that required seven keepers to maintain, and finally electricity to give the lighthouse it's light. Assateague Island Lighthouse is only open for climbing a few times during the year.

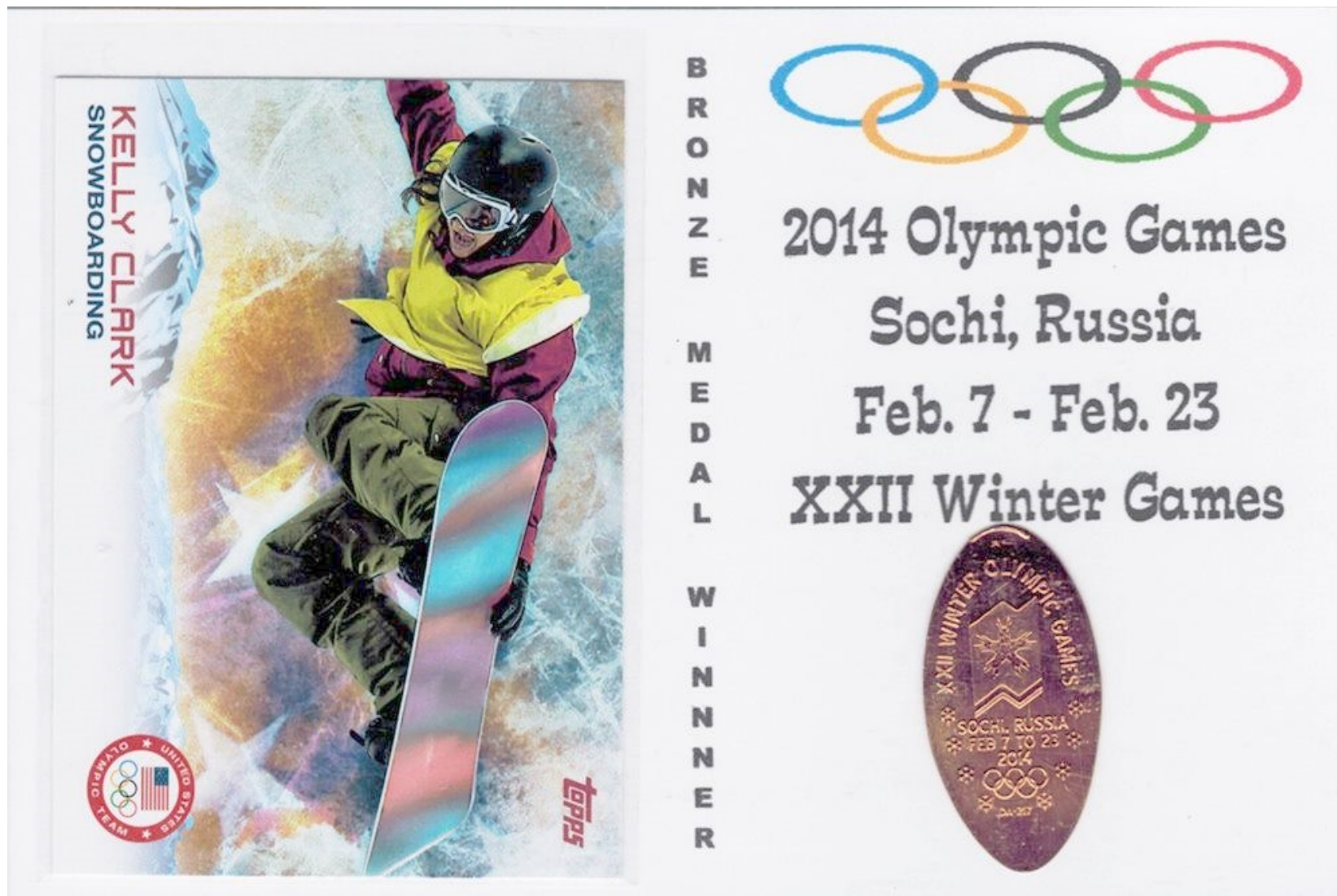
